All the words and phrases included in this guide are those which have been used by patients during consultations and have been included to assist doctors who do not speak English as a first language. Note: whilst these phrases are commonly used locally, some people may find them offensive.

How ya?	How are you?
What's the craic?	How are you doing?
What's the story?	What is happening with you?
How's she cuttin'?	How are you doing?

I want to throw up	I want to vomit
I'm wracked with pain	I am suffering from a lot of pain
I have a problem with the waterworks	I have a problem with urination/passing water
I'm all bound up/ I'm all bunged up	I am constipated
It turns my stomach	I feel sick thinking about it
The ticker is acting up	My heart is not as it should be
He is a bit out of puff	He is out of breath
I have the runs	I have diarrhoea
I'm off the fags	I'm off the cigarettes
I'm on the gargle	I have been drinking
I'm lost for words	I have no words to respond
I can't think straight	I am confused
My head is thumping	I have a headache
He is a shadow of himself	He lost a lot of weight fast
Alive and kicking	I feel well
At death's door	Very ill
Black out	Unconscious
Bundle of nerves	Very worried and concerned
Check up	Consultation
A clean bill of health	Healthcare professional has no more checks to do, all is well
I'm a bit under the weather	I am feeling unwell

Nuts	Mental health issues / testicles
Me Willie/Me mickey	Penis
I'm up to 90	I am very worried
Going like the clappers	Going very fast
I'm knackered (cream crackered)	I am exhausted
I'm banjaxed	I feel broken
I'm in bleedin' agony	I am in pain
Puke	Vomit
Goin' to the jacks	I am going to the toilet
Goin' for a lash	I am going to the toilet
Hackin' me guts up	I was coughing a lot
Frog in my throat	Thick phlegm stuck in my throat
Put it on the long finger	Delay doing something
An awful dose	I felt very ill with this ailment
Waiting to get the once over	Waiting for a check-up
Wearing the ear off me	Being admonished / Constant complaining
The scutters/the runs	Diarrhoea







Alcohol word or phrase in context	Meaning
I had a one and one	I had a pint and a short (chaser)
I had a pint and a chaser	I drank a pint of beer followed by distilled spirits
Mocktails	Non alcoholic drinks
I had a few scoops	I had a few alcohol drinks
I was on the gargle	I was drinking a lot of alcohol
I'm back on the wagon/on the dry	I am no longer drinking alcohol (for now)
I've had a few rollies	I had a few cigarettes/(may also refer to marijuana)
I'm on the 'gangie'	I am smoking marijuana
A bit of dope	I am taking some marijuana
Prinks	Drinks at home before going out to a bar/pub/ nightclub
I've got the DT's	Delirium tremens (DTs) is the most severe form of ethanol withdrawal, manifested by altered mental status (global confusion) and sympathetic overdrive (autonomic hyperactivity), which can progress to cardiovascular collapse. Minor alcohol withdrawal is characterized by tremor, anxiety, nausea, vomiting, and insomnia.
I roll me own	I prepare my own cigarettes/(may also refer to marijuana)
I puked my guts up last night	I vomited all my stomach contents last night
Alcopop	Alcopops are sweet alcoholic drinks consisting of a mixture of distilled spirits and lemonades, fruit juices or non-alcoholic drink
Bubbly	Champagne or Prosecco - sparkling alocoholic drinks
Keg	A small cask or barrel usually storing alcohol
Spirits	A distilled alcoholic drink
Six-pack	Six bottles of beer packaged together
Plonk	Cheap, low quality wine/beer
Mixers	Non alcoholic (soft drinks) that are combined with alcoholic drinks
A slab	Usually 24 cans of beer packaged together
Beer belly	Abdominal obesity can also be referred to as a spare tire, or the middle-age spread
